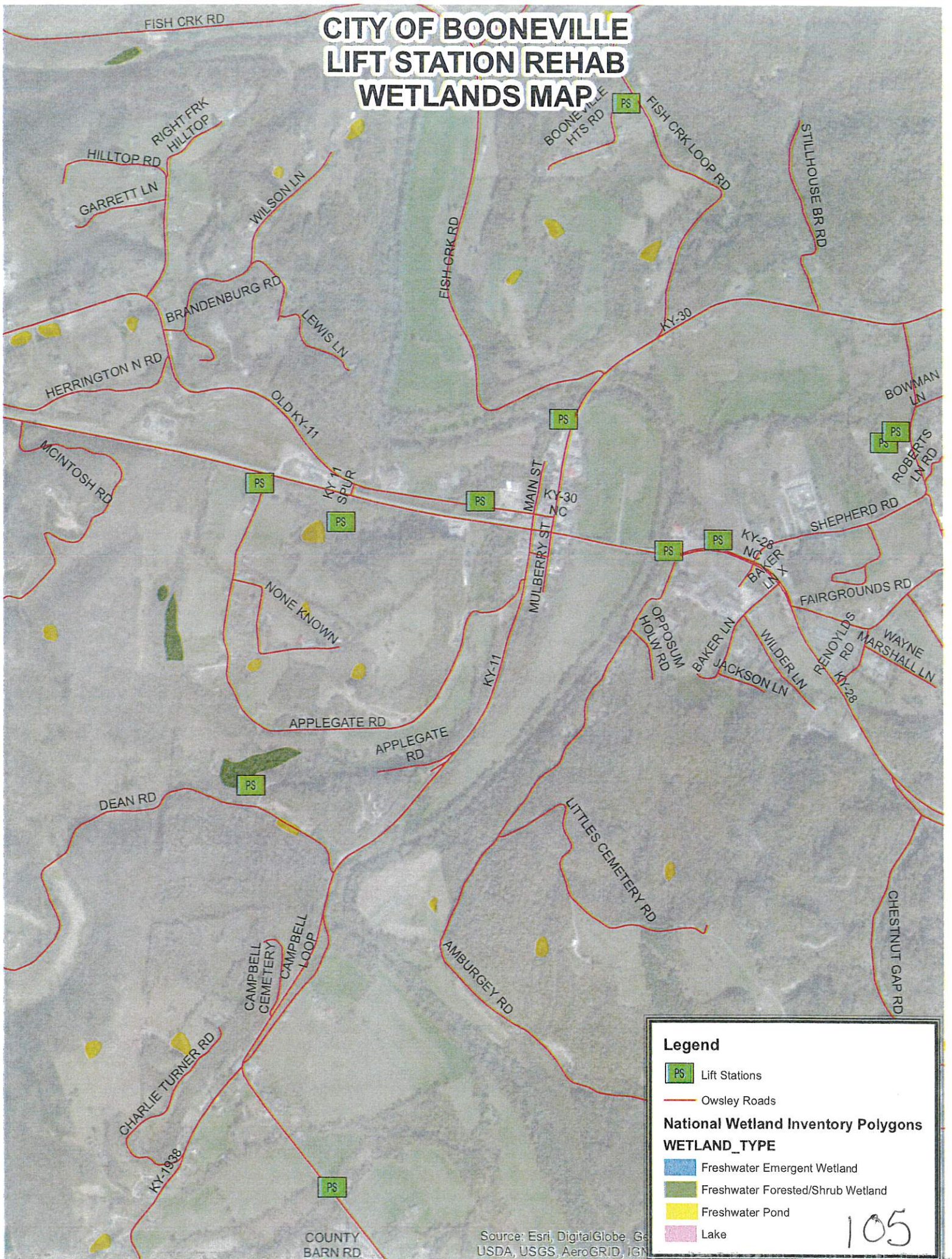


CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT STATION REHAB WETLANDS MAP

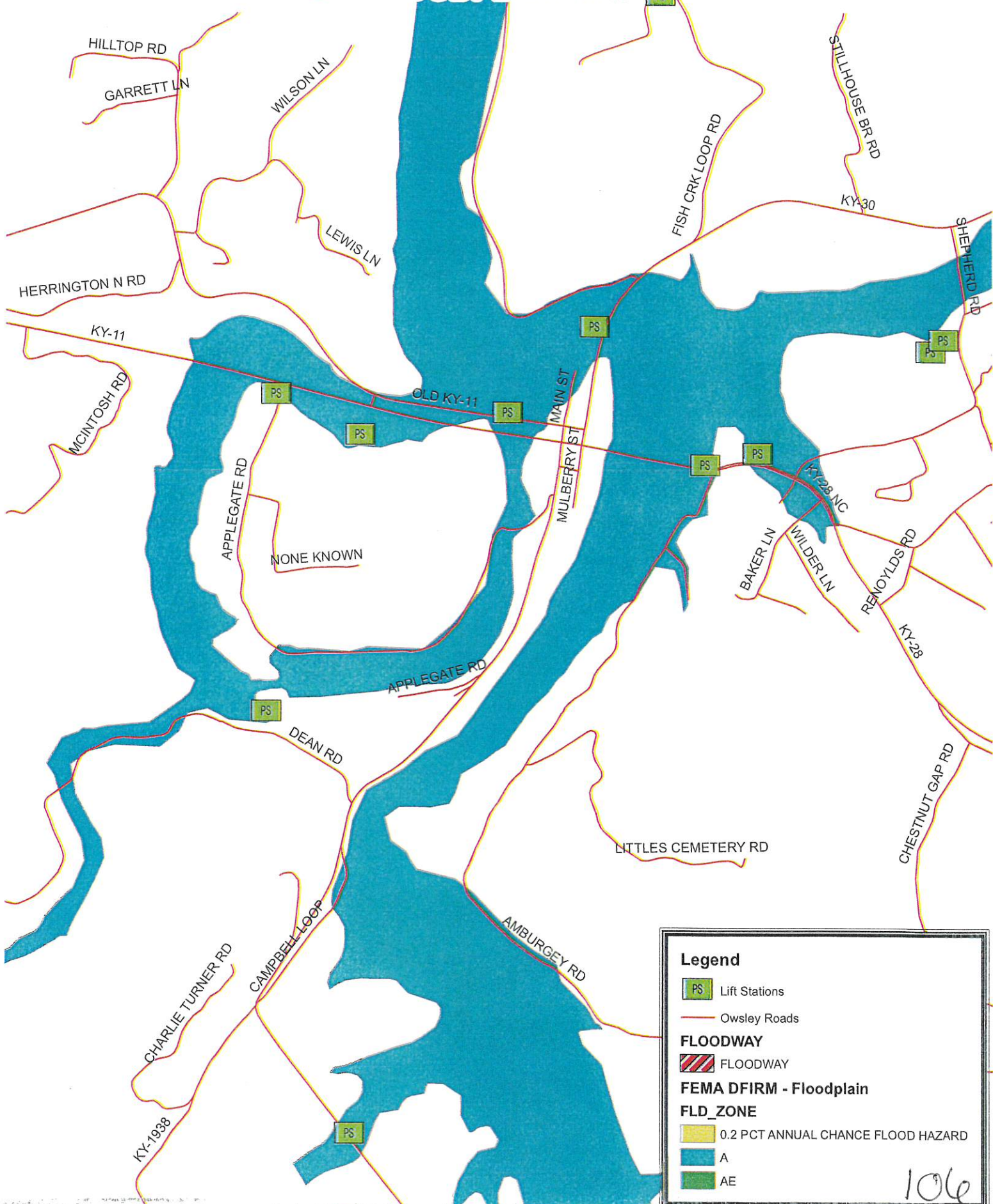

A Legislative Perspective with State Representative Cluster Howard



FRANKFORT (April 27, 2020) – By design, it's not easy to pass a new law. A proposal can't begin without at least one legislative sponsor, and then it must navigate through the General Assembly and the governor's office while competing against hundreds of other bills trying to make the same journey. Limited resources, a ticking clock, politics and unforeseen events like a worldwide pandemic make the process exponentially more difficult.

Now, that this year's legislative session is over, it's worth taking a look back at the ideas that didn't make it, since most will likely be before General Assembly again when it returns to the Capitol in January.

Some bills are perennial members on this list, even though they enjoy wide public support.

Medical marijuana, for example, routinely gets numerous sponsors in the House, but it wasn't until this year that it actually cleared the chamber. Even though more than 30 states have taken this step and a recent statewide poll by the Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky found 90 percent of Kentuckians are in favor of it, this legislation unfortunately was not heard in the Senate.

A constitutional amendment allowing Kentucky voters to decide whether we should have expanded gaming is another idea that has been around for years. Legislative leaders have shown little support, however, even though it has generated hundreds of millions of tax dollars for several surrounding states.

If the odds for that seem long, the ones for sports wagering may

be improving. This year, it cleared a House committee unanimously, and next year, when sports will hopefully be back in some form and the state will be in dire need of new revenue sources, there's a good chance this one will pass.

Criminal justice reform – like tax or education reform – is an ongoing, multi-faceted issue, and some years have seen more success than others. Still, at a time when our prisons and jails meet or exceed capacity, there is broad agreement that more needs to be done.

This year, the General Assembly did pass two laws to make it easier for those on probation to reduce their time under state supervision and to let the state move prisoners from overcrowded jails. Only the House, though, voted for legislation that would raise the dollar amount for felony theft and fraud charges, a figure that has been flat for years. This sensible step could a long way toward reducing incarceration rates.

One criminal justice measure that should have taken long ago is a constitutional amendment that would automatically restore voting rights for most felons after they complete their sentence. The House used to routinely pass this type of bill, but that hasn't happened in several years.

Governor Andy Beshear did sign an executive order in December restoring these rights for more than 150,000 Kentuckians with a non-violent felony record, but it will take a constitutional amendment to make this permanent. It's worth noting that nearly every other state already has this in some form.

Another proposal

Kentucky definitely needs is one that would cap insulin prices for many diabetics at \$100 a month. Although production costs for this life-saving drug are low, it nevertheless has seen its price jump in recent years, forcing many diabetics to ration insulin at great risk to their health. I'm proud the House voted unanimously for a bill to keep these costs affordable.

While these bills won't become law this year, many will undoubtedly be studied more when House and Senate committees begin what they call the interim in June. These joint meetings are important because they give supporters and opponents alike more time in a less-heckle setting to explain why bills should or should not pass the legislature.

On a final note, I was happy to learn that Governor Beshear and Secretary of State Michael Adams announced on Friday that every registered voter can request an absentee ballot for the June 23rd primary or otherwise take part in early voting.

This bipartisan move will make it much safer for voters and poll workers alike as we try to limit the spread of the coronavirus, and hopefully it will set a precedent to allow for early, excuse-free voting in the years to come. That's an issue that needs to be on the legislature's agenda next year, as well.

To: All interested Agencies all Federal, State, and Local Groups and Individuals

This is to give notice that the City of Booneville under 24 CFR Part 58 has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management, to determine the potential affect that its project in the floodplain and wetland will have on the human environment for Booneville Pump Station Rehabilitation Project under 20A-032/KY 19835. The proposed project is located at multiple locations in the City of Booneville, Owsley County, Kentucky. The purpose of this project is to rehabilitate eleven (11) pump stations ensuring reliable and efficient wastewater collection and transportation to the regional treatment facility for proper treatment. The project will replace pumps at each pump station and install new rails and controls improving service to 248 households and 31 businesses in the Booneville service area.

The City of Booneville has considered the following alternatives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial values: The City of Booneville evaluated alternatives. The first option was to do nothing and risk pump failures resulting in sanitary sewer overflows in violation of KPDES wastewater permit conditions and producing negative environmental impacts. This option was not feasible due to the impact it would have on the environment. The second option was to rehab individual pump stations as the City budget allowed. This option was not feasible due to the City budget limits. The third option was to construct project as designed. Part of the project may be in the 100-year floodplain as designated by the March 16, 2009 FEMA Floodplain Maps; with very minimal impacts to the floodplain areas.

The City of Booneville has re-evaluated the alternatives to building in the floodplain and has determined that it has no practicable alternative. Environmental files that document compliance with steps 3 through 6 of [Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990], are available for public inspection, review and copying upon request at the times and location delineated in the last paragraph of this notice for receipt of comments. This activity will have no significant impact on the environment for the following reasons:

The construction of the Booneville Pump Station Rehabilitation Project in the floodplain areas will disturb very minimal surface area during construction. The construction/design of the project involves rehabbing eleven (11) aging pump stations and installing new rails and controls to ensure proper operation, prevent overflows, and reduce the likelihood of environmental impacts. Once completed the project will not impede the floodplain. This is the most economical and least environmentally impacting alternative considered.

Kentucky Healthcare Providers Receive \$452 Million to Combat Coronavirus from McConnell's CARES Act

WASHINGTON, DC—U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) announced today Kentucky healthcare providers will receive \$452,761,171 in federal funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to support their ongoing fight against the coronavirus. Today's announcement is the first distribution of the \$100 billion appropriated by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act to provide critical relief for healthcare providers. This is the most significant discretionary funding source available directly to hospitals and providers in modern times. This first allotment of funding will be distributed among more than 3,900 Kentucky medical providers and systems, based on their share of

certain 2019 Medicare reimbursements. Future distributions of funding to Kentucky will follow different metrics established by HHS.

The funding is the result of CARES Act, which Senator McConnell introduced and led to passage last month. The bipartisan CARES Act, which is the biggest rescue package in history, passed with a 96 to 0 vote and was signed into law by President Donald Trump. As a result of the CARES Act, Kentucky will receive at least \$1.25 billion in relief.

"One of the primary goals of the CARES Act was to rush new resources to our healthcare heroes battling the coronavirus in hospitals and emergency rooms. The immediate cash relief announced today will help these medical providers fulfill their mission to care for those

in need. Doctors, nurses and other professionals are showing inspirational courage as they work on the frontlines of this crisis. Along with all Kentuckians, I'm grateful for their sacrifice and dedication to protect the health of our communities," said Senator McConnell. "We can all do our part to support the work of our medical professionals by listening to the experts, protecting the health of ourselves and our families, and looking for ways to help our neighbors in need. We will get through this crisis together."

In addition to today's announcement, Kentucky has so far received more than \$350 million to address urgent housing, transportation, healthcare, education and economic development priorities from the CARES Act.

This project will consist of the following: (1) Pump Station #1 - Highway 30 at New Bridge - replace pumps, oil line, check valves and guide rail, (2) Pump Station #2 - Grade School - replace pumps and guide rail, (3) Pump Station #3 - Old Highway 11 - replace pumps and replace rail system, (4) Pump Station #4 - Highway 28 Bridge - replace pumps and increase storage capacity, (5) Pump Station #5 - Nursing Home - replace pumps and guide rail, (6) Pump Station #6 - Applegate - replace pumps, valves and one gate valve, (7) Pump Station #7 - Buck Creek - replace one pump and replace rail system, (8) Pump Station #8 - Library - replace pumps, (9) Pump Station #9 - Dump Hill - replace pumps, (10) Pump Station #10 - Lerose - replace pumps, and (11) Pump Station #11 - Sewer Plant - replace pumps. 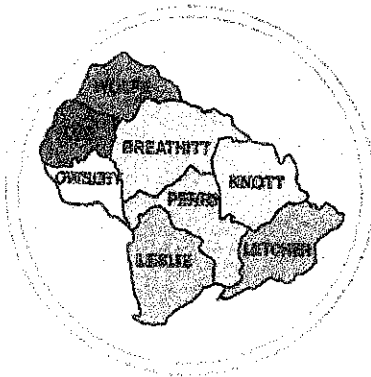

The purpose of the City of Booneville's Pump Station Rehab Project is to improve the wastewater system by rehabbing the aging pump stations to ensure proper operation, prevent overflows, and reduce the likelihood of environmental impacts.

Detailed work plan

1. The Booneville Pump Station Rehabilitation Project will rehabilitate the existing pump stations in the wastewater system.

a. The project will:

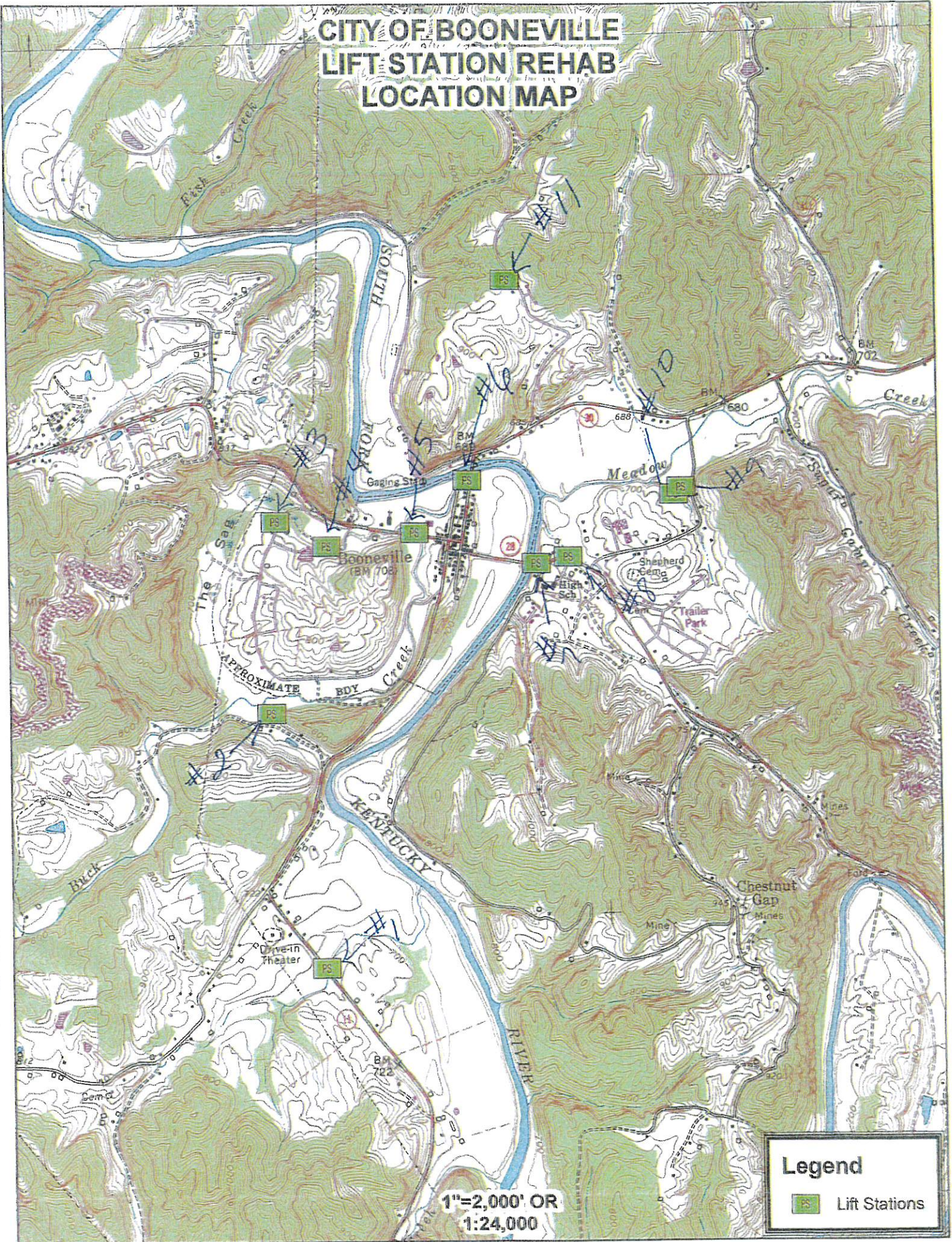
- PS #1 Hwy 30 – Replace pumps, oil line, check valves and guide rail,
- PS #2 Grade School – Replace pumps and guide rail;
- PS #3 Old Hwy 11 – Replace pumps and replace rail system;
- PS #4 Hwy 28 Bridge – Replace pumps and increase storage capacity;
- PS #5 Nursing Home – Replace pumps and guide rail;
- PS #6 Applegate – Replace pumps, valves and one gate valve;
- PS #7 Buck Creek – Replace one pump and replace rail system;
- PS #8 Library – Replace pumps;
- PS #9 Dump Hill – Replace pumps;
- PS #10 Lerose – Replace pumps; and
- PS #11 Sewer Plant – Replace pumps

The project will be based in Owsley County Kentucky which consists of census tracts 9901 and 9902. The project service area is located in census tract 9901 and 9902. (see Attachment 1).

Detailed project maps are attached. See Attachment 1.

The project will improve energy efficiency as the existing pumps are old and outdated. Newer model pumps do not need to continuously operate in order to effectively pump the sewage to the plant for treatment. Instead the pumps will be able to sense when volume is high and will work only when necessary. The existing pumps utilize more energy to operate and the new pumps will reduce the energy required to operate thus reducing costs for the City of Booneville and will reduce wear and tear to the pumps and other components.

CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT STATION REHAB SITE PLAN MAP

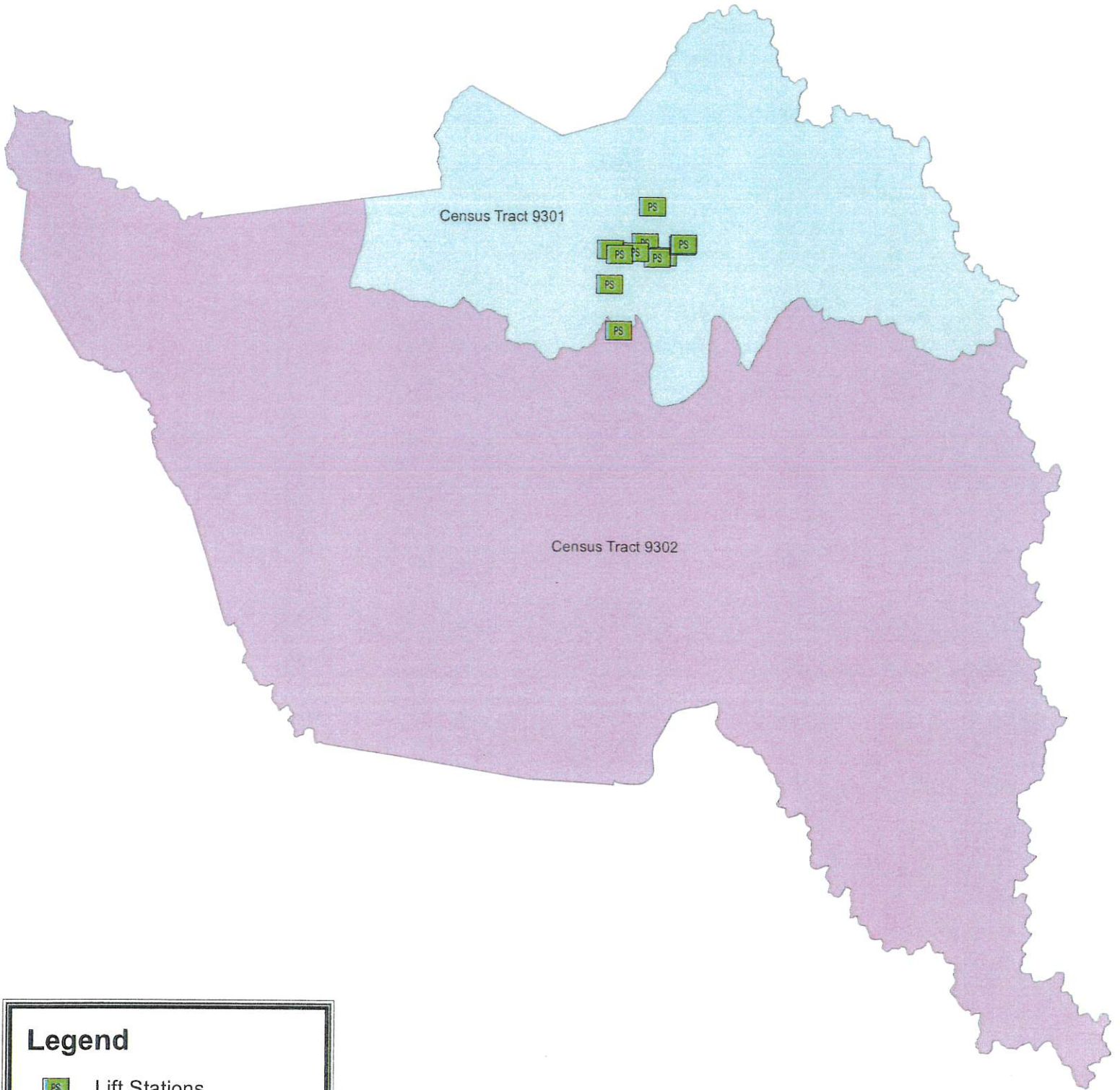

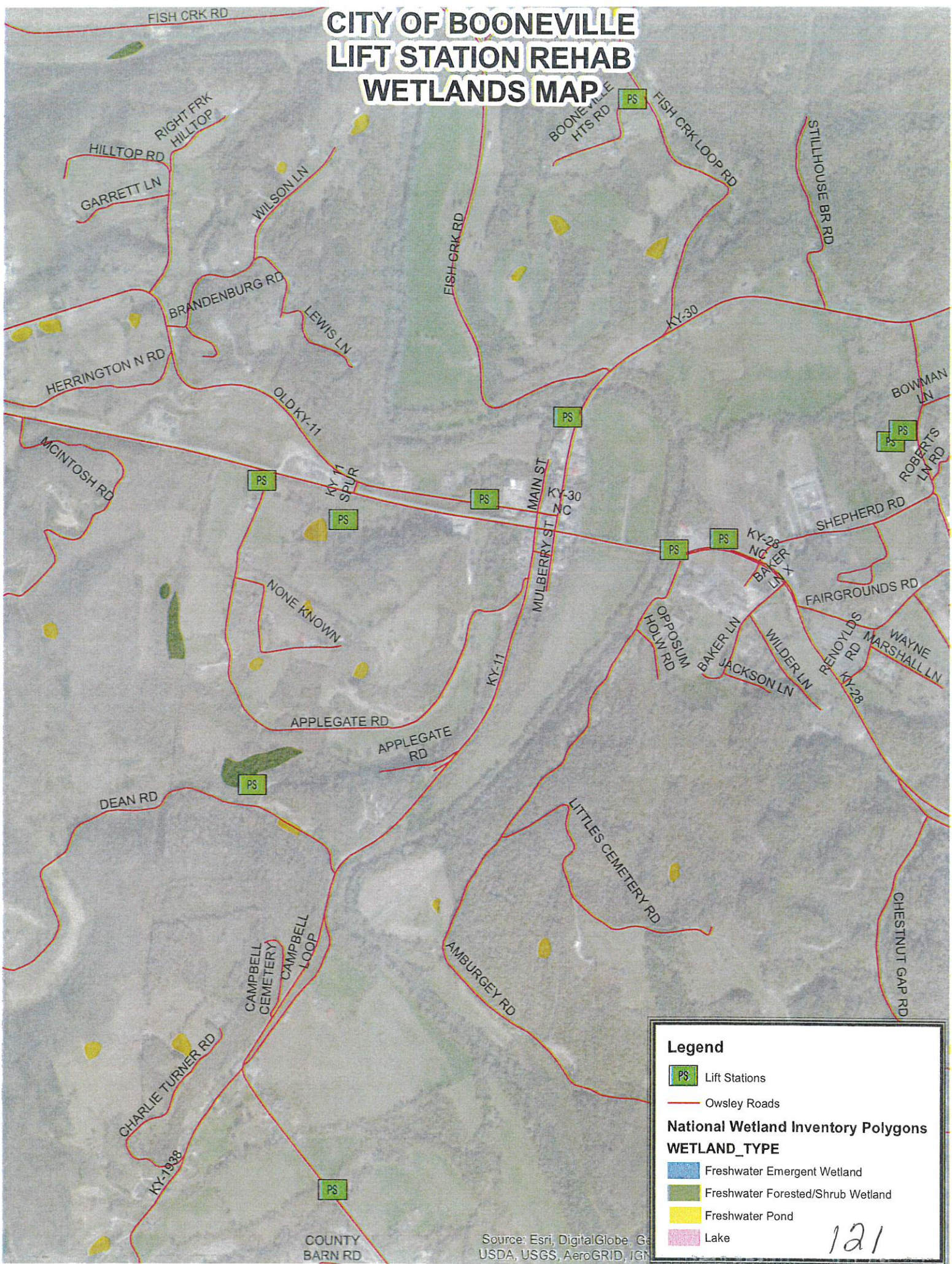

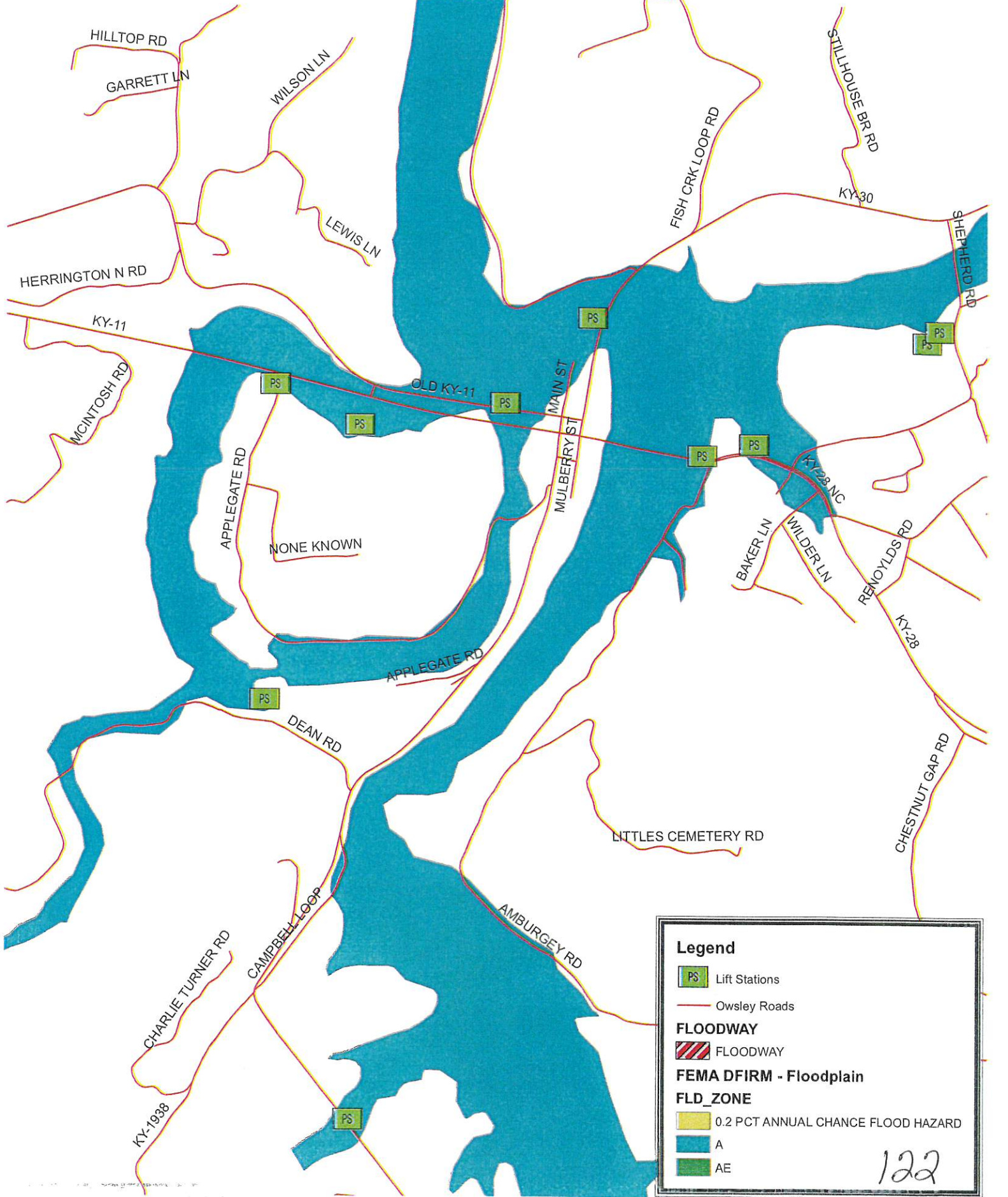

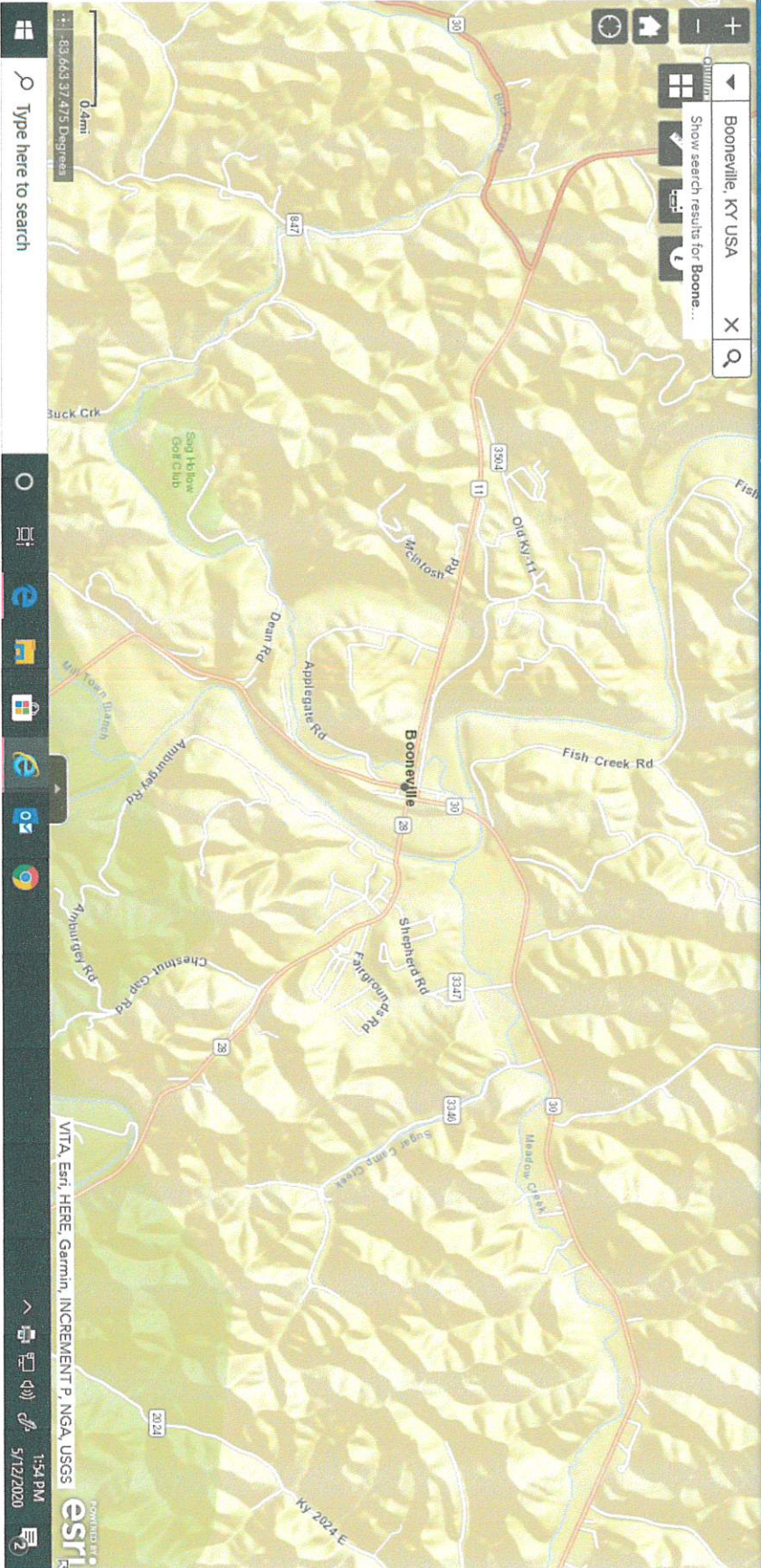

Sole Source Aquifer Data

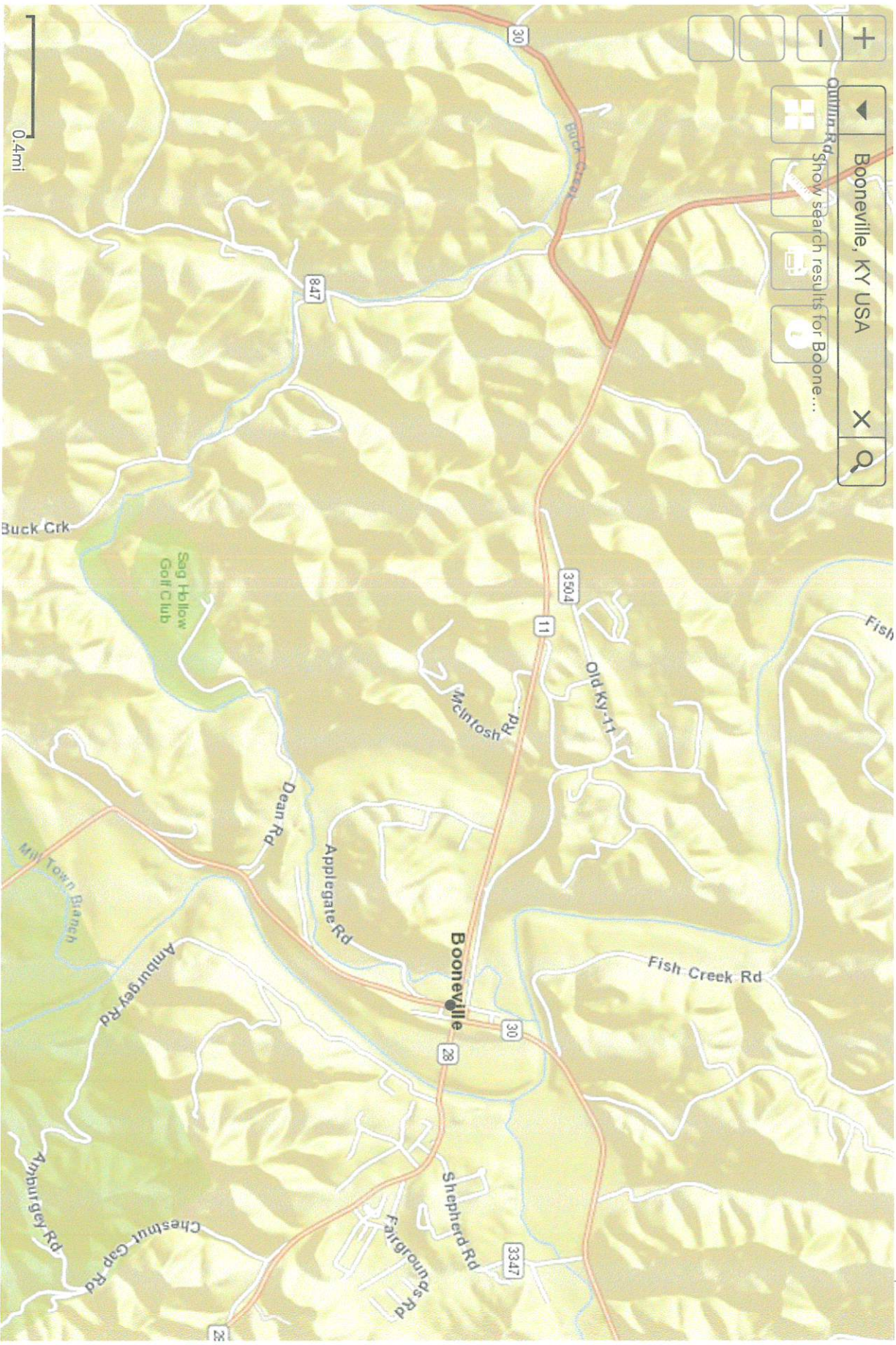

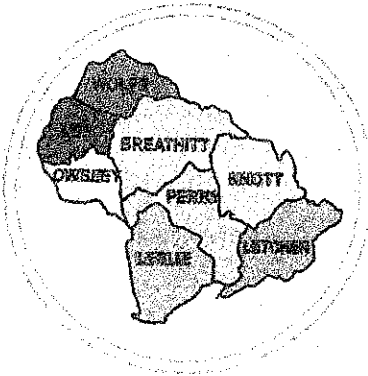

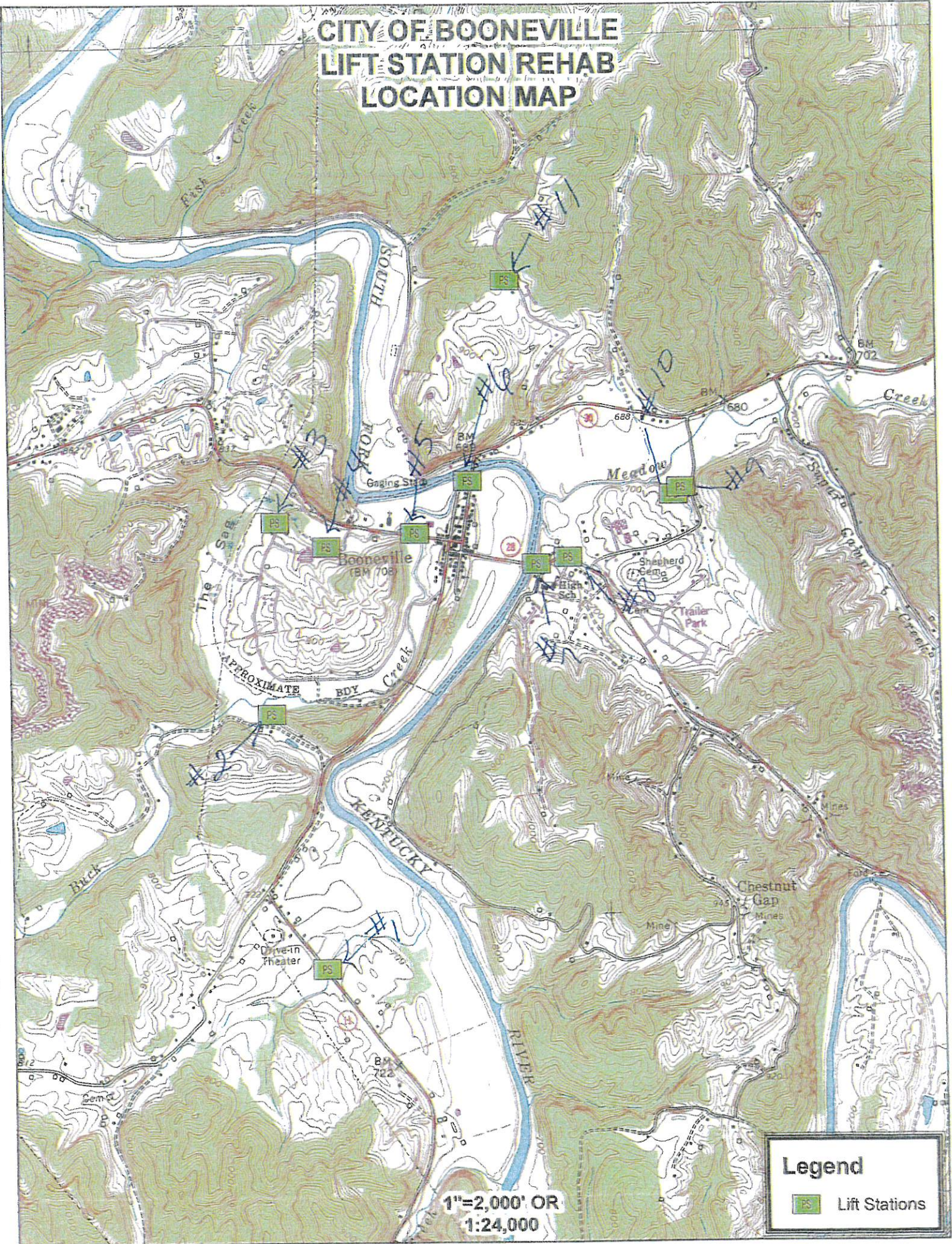

CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT-STATION REHAB LOCATION MAP

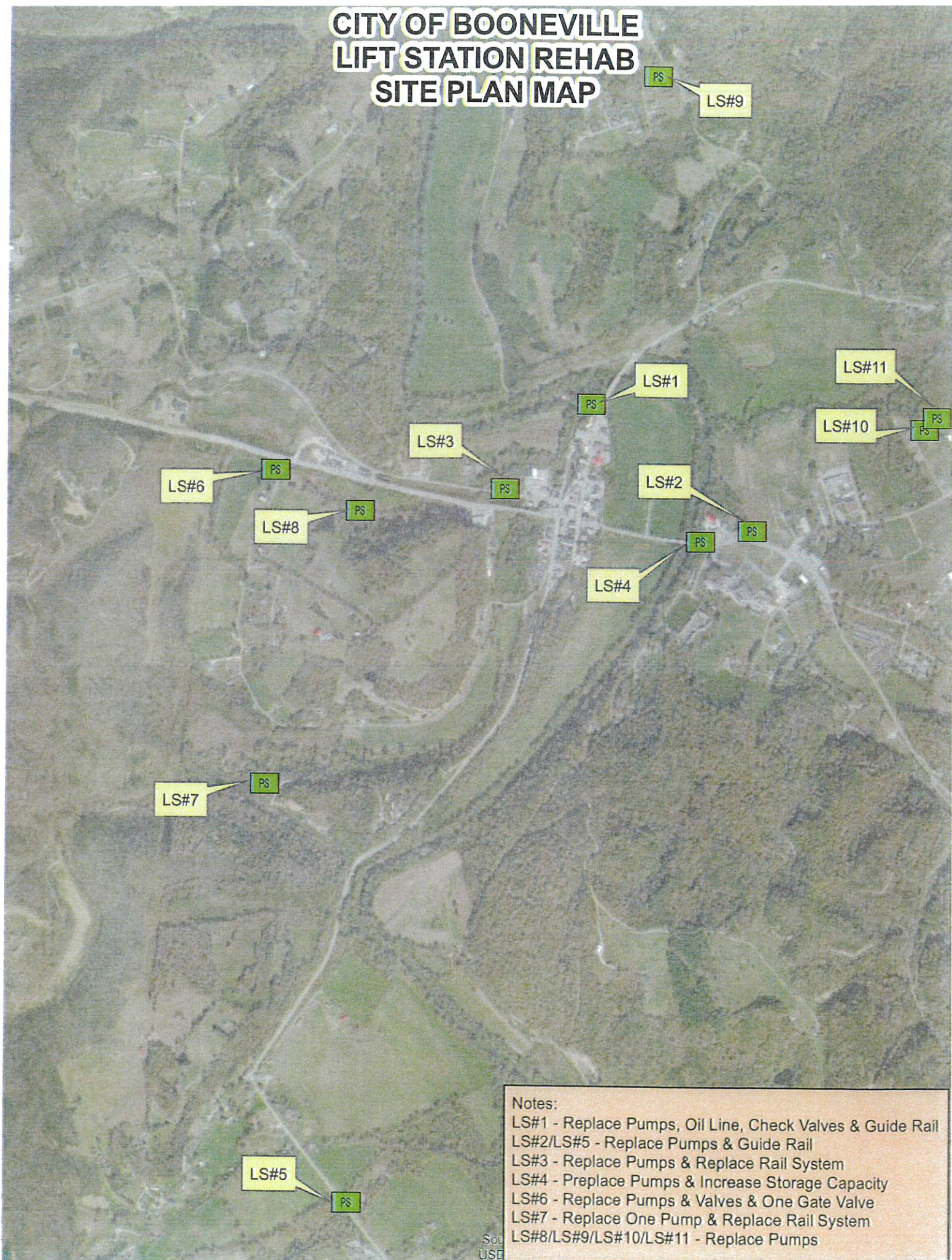

CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT STATION REHAB SITE PLAN MAP

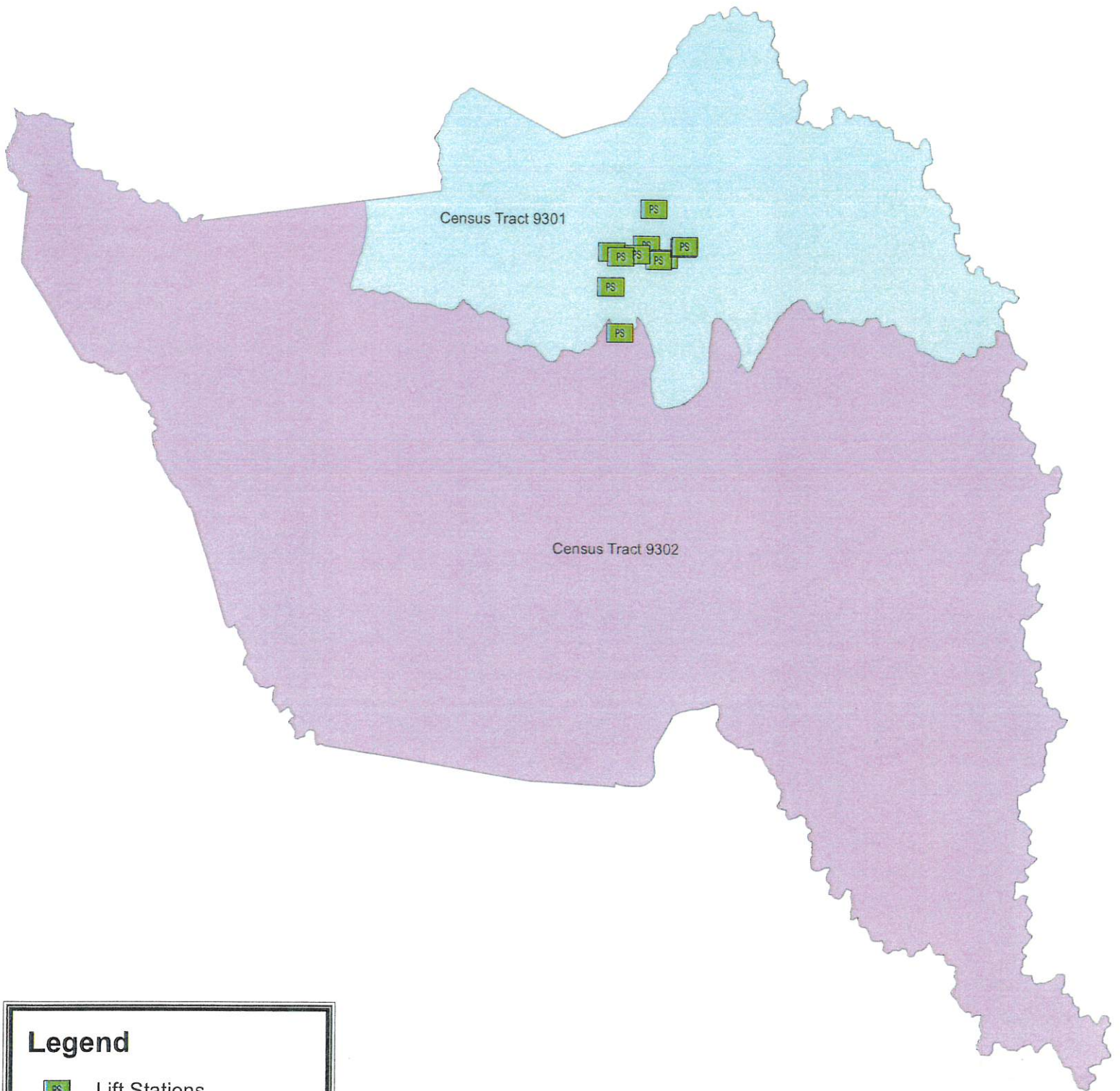

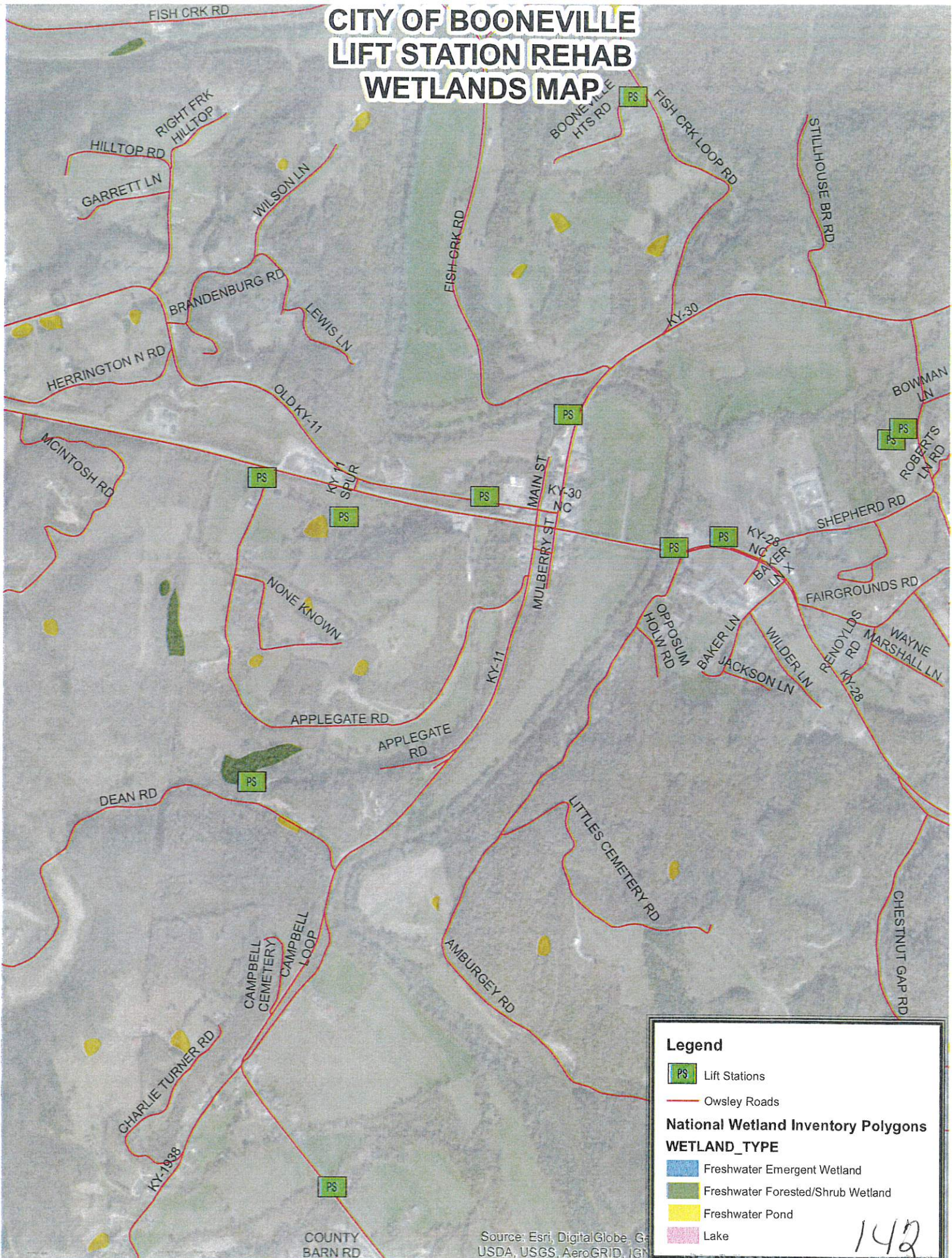

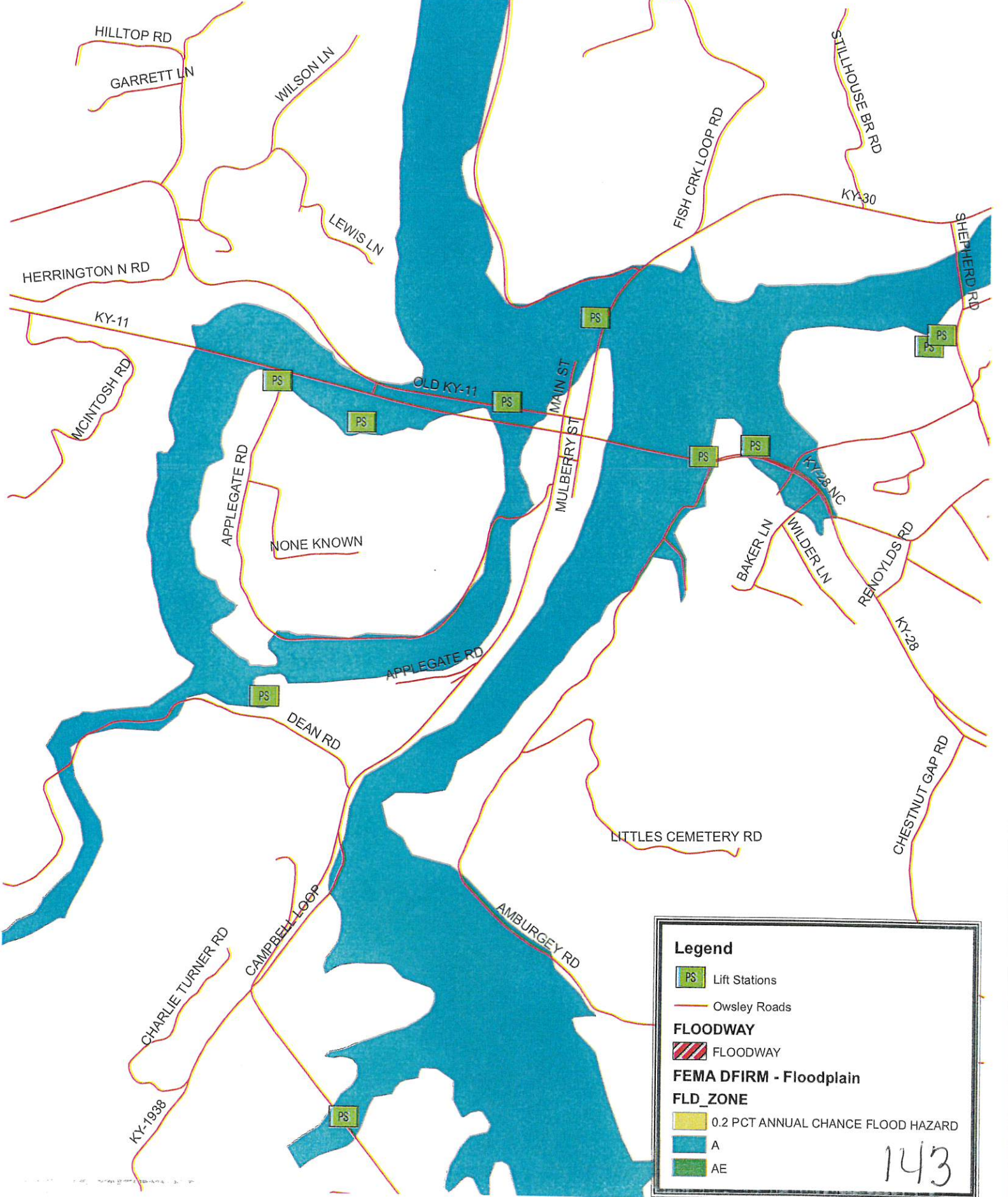

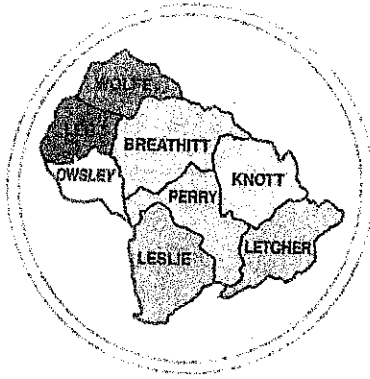

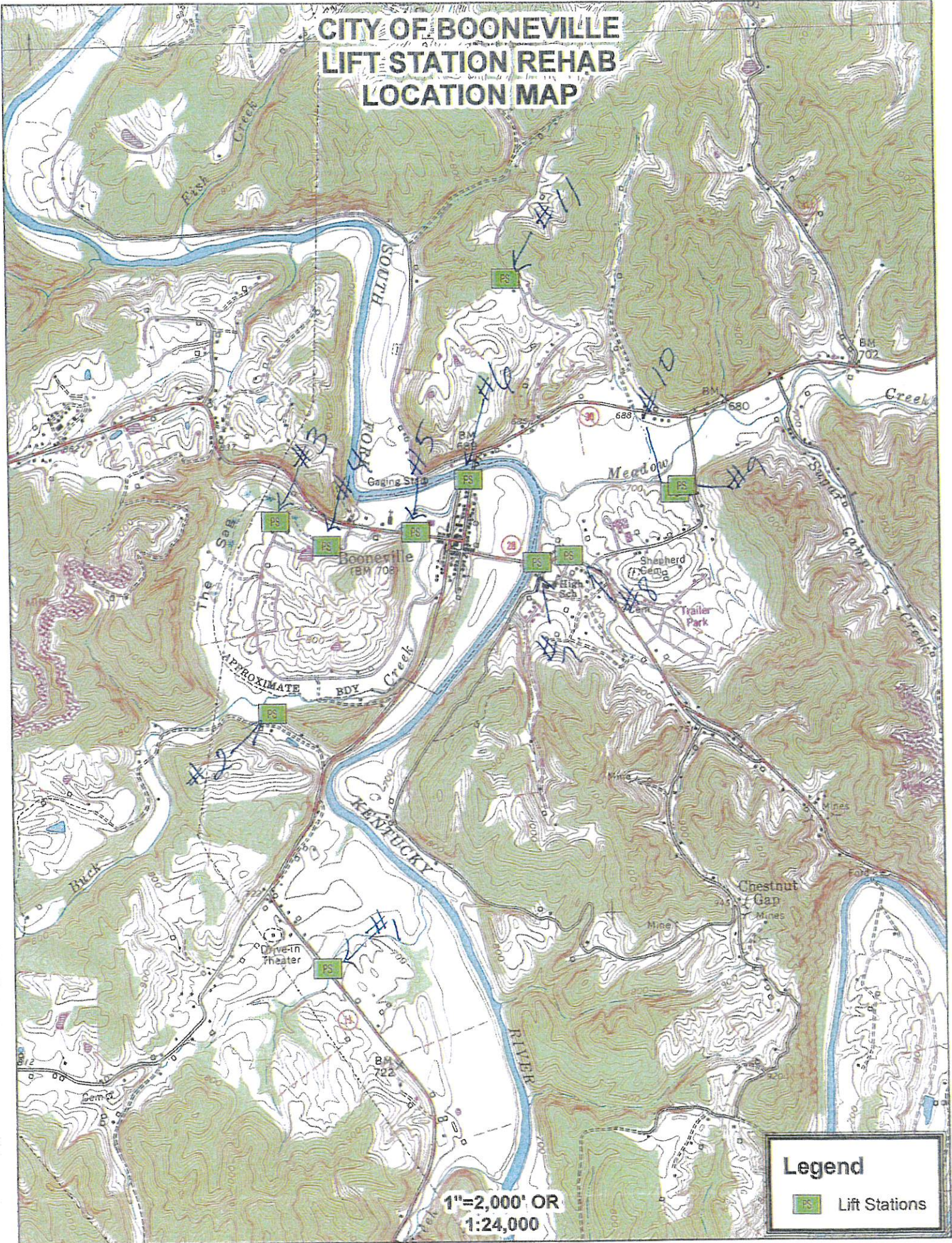
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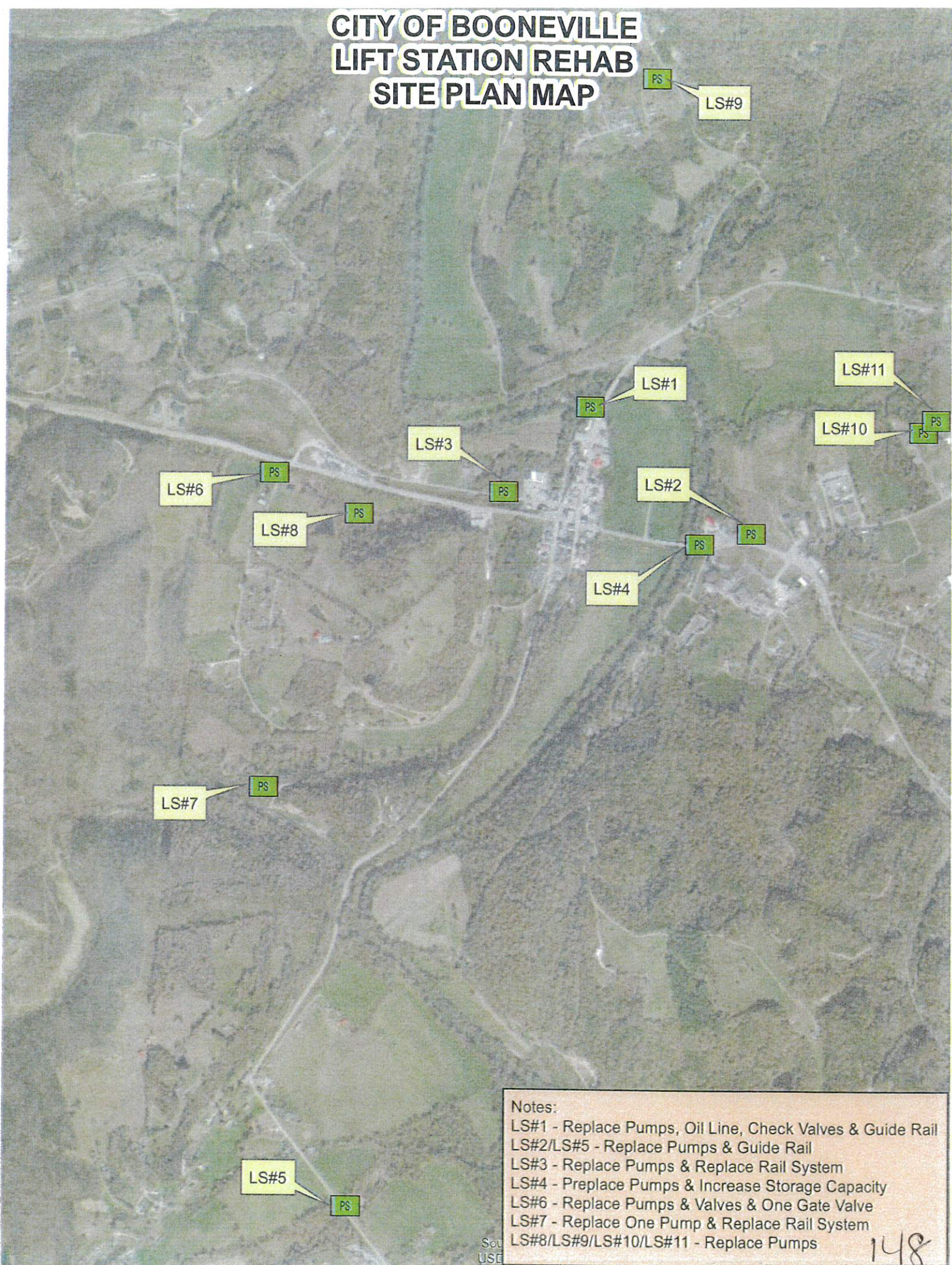
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CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT STATION REHAB LOCATION MAP



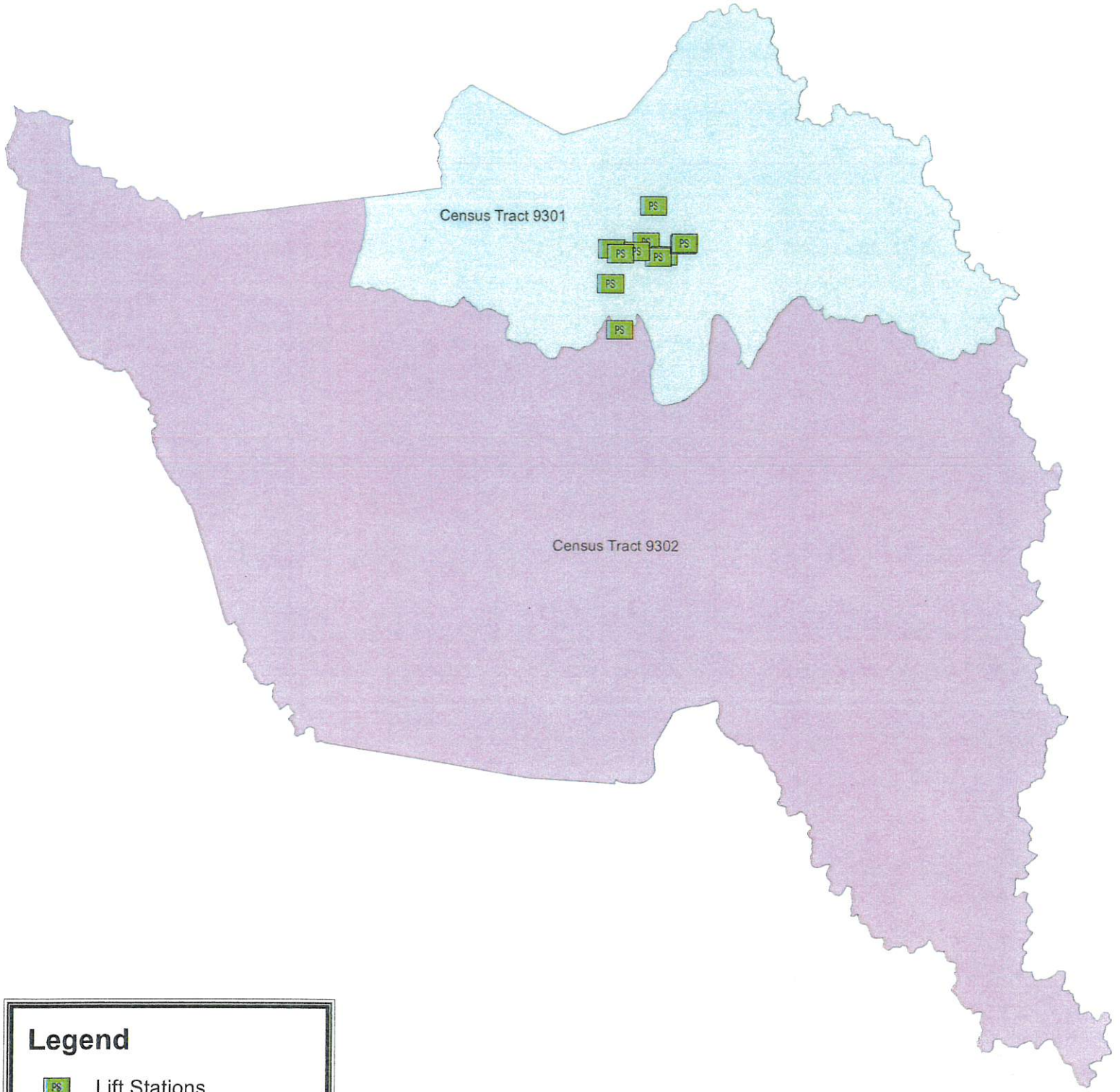
CITY OF BOONEVILLE LIFT STATION REHAB SITE PLAN MAP
